This meeting led to the creation of the first volume in this series, *The Jesuits*, which examined the worldwide Jesuit undertaking in such fields as music, art, architecture, devotional writing, mathematics, physics, astronomy, natural history, public performance, and education, with special attention to the Jesuits' interaction with non-European cultures. With contributions from distinguished scholars from a dozen different countries, *The Jesuits, II* continues in the illustrious tradition of its predecessor to make an important contribution to religious memory.

Budge excavated and deciphered numerous cuneiform and hieroglyphic documents, contributing vastly to the museum's collection. Eventually, he became the Keeper of his department, specializing in Egyptology. Budge wrote many books during his lifetime, most specializing in Egyptian life, religion, and language.
